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Welcome Back Christina Irion, 4-H Intern!

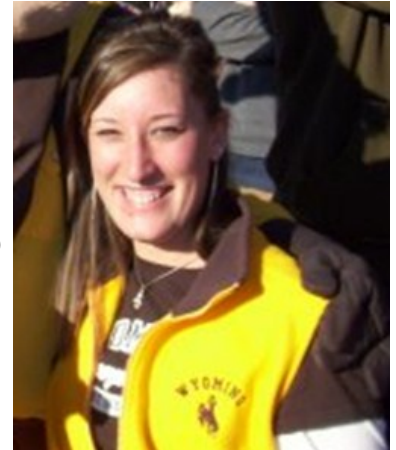
Hello Teton County! It feels so nice to be back! Thank you everyone for the warm welcome! It feels so nice to know how much you all are excited to have me here.

Character Counts Responsibility

June 2011

RESPONSIBILITY Life is full of choices..... Which path will you take?

Responsibility requires you to recognize that what you do — and what you don't do — matters. Responsibility is directly connected to good work habits; are others depending on you to show up on time, be prepared and ready to do your work, stick to the job until it is done. Often times we wait for others to tell us what needs to be done, but can we take initiative and do things without being told? Think about the following examples and what your actions would be:

- ◆ You're walking down the side walk and there is a muddy piece of paper laying on the ground. Do you pick it up? Or keep walking
- ◆ Record books are due in two weeks and yours is not completed. Do you wait until your parents or leaders ask you to work on them? Or do you ask if you can work on them.
- ◆ You arrive home early one day and your animals have not been fed. Do you wait until a parent gets home to feed them? Or do you go get them fed?
- ◆ Your crocheting project is not completed yet for the year and you have some free time. Do you work on the project or wait until your leader or parents tells you to work on it?

Responsibility Activity

Time needed: 15-20
minutes

Supplies Needed:

- ⇒ Several pieces of poster board or carpet squares cut into different sizes. Each board needs to be big enough for two people to stand on it.
- ⇒ Masking tape
- ⇒ Radio or boom box.

Instructions:

You are going to play a game called "I'll Save You." Several different rescue boats have been placed around the room. We are going to play music, when the music stops, you must immediately get into a rescue boat— the more crowded the better. Pull as many people onto the boat as you possibly can. The object is get everyone pulled out of the water and onto the boat in 3 seconds. Please place safely. Should you fail to save everyone trying to get onto your boat, the entire group at that boat will drown and you have to sit out of the game. If you ignore saving someone near you, the whole group will drown. Make sure everyone understands the rules and will make a commitment to try and rescue their friends. Each time the music stops and starts again, a rescue boat is taken away as it sank. Here are some discussion questions at the conclusion of the activity:

1. Were you able to save everyone that you attempted to save?
2. What happened when you couldn't get everyone onto your rescue boat? How did that affect the whole group on that boat?
3. Did it get harder as boats left and how is that related to life in general? Did you want to quit?

The Other 4 H's

Hard-working, harmonious, hustling, highway cleaners! There are now another 4 H's. Saturday, May 14th, 42 4-Hers and their parents and leaders turned out to pick up the litter to enhance the appearance of the initial stretch of Highway 22 extending two miles from it's origin at the "Y", to just before the entrance to Skyline Ranch.

An exceptional group of youth and adults from a variety of 4-H clubs turned out to demonstrate their pride in their community during the annual Teton County Clean-Up Week. Donning leather work gloves, orange safety vests, and carrying bright orange plastic bags, the large group divided into 8 small work groups. Each group of young people departed in a vehicle with at least one adult. There were two groups on each side of the highway at both the start of the assigned highway section and at the finish. Each of those four groups started "picking" their way toward the other 4 groups who started on each side of the highway at the middle (1 mile mark) and worked their way toward the other four groups.

Numerous signs inviting passing motorists to join Teton County 4-H were displayed along the stretch of highway, as well as large green wooden clovers made by the Wild Wood Workers. These gave great positive visibility to our organization.

For the first attempt at establishing an efficient plan to successfully clean, without overlooking even any little bit of this 4-H road assignment, this design seemed to work very well. The entire two miles were completed in about an hour and ten minutes. The weather was so cooperative with warm sunny skies, but ultimately it was the spirit of the 4-H clubbers that was most motivating and contagious. Everyone was cheerful, cooperative, industrious and eager to work.

This crew will probably agree that work can be fun as noted with the humor displayed in interactions, game of litter toss into the orange bag held by a fellow 4-H'er, the diversion of water play at the small pond, and the pride in the "treasures" discovered. There was not a formal check-in at the end of the clean-up, so there were probably other unique finds besides the two unspent shotgun shells, the numerous vehicle parts, the glo-stick still in its packaging, and the metal GMC car emblem. For the next clean-up outing, there

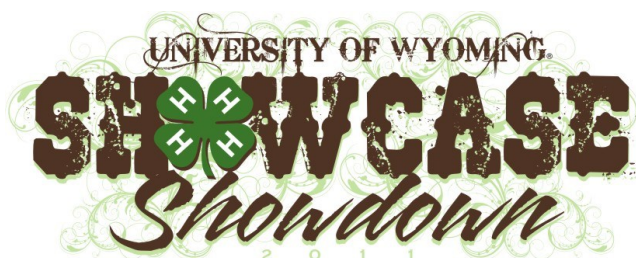

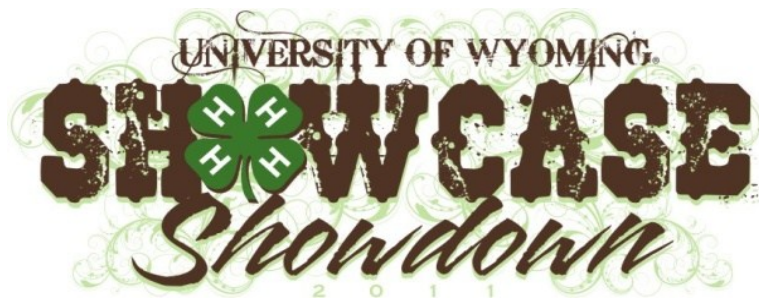
State 4-H Leadership Team

8 Essential Elements of Youth Development



Concept: Belonging Essential Element: A Safe Emotional and Physical Environment

Youth should not fear physical or emotional harm while participating in a 4-H experience, whether from the learning environment itself or from adults, other participants or spectators.

What Does this Look Like in a Club?

- Youth members do not tolerate bullying, cliques or put downs within their clubs.
- The club will work in safe areas that limits the amount of danger present.
- The area will be adequately equipped for activities that will take place.
- All members, leaders and adults know the safety risks (emotionally and physically), and are trained to manage the risks accordingly.

How do we support this Element in our clubs?

- Make sure every activity and situation is treated consistently within your club
- Make sure all volunteers are screened before they begin working with youth and receive continual training in safety and child protection
- Make sure all leaders, adults, and youth are trained in safety and risk management practices.
- Actively engage youth in planning implementing and evaluating programs.
- Include the youth voice when strategizing ways to improve the group's environment..

Re-enforcement Activity/Ice Breaker

1. Have all members sit in a line.
2. Start at the beginning of the line and whisper a "rumor" about someone in the room or make someone up but only tell the first person.
3. Have the member whisper in the next person's ear
4. After everyone has heard the "rumor" have the last person in the line tell the group what they heard.
5. Tell the group what was originally said.
6. Reflect about the rumors that you told and how rumors can change

How do members feel about rumors? How do rumors hurt them emotionally? How can they help stop rumors and stop bringing others down emotionally.



Developing trust depends on safe environments for members to grow emotionally and physically.

Gain respect by respecting other members, leaders and their property.

Demonstrate Responsibility by making sure you are in an emotionally and physically safe environment.

Be Fair by being consistent in how you deal with one another and misbehavior.

Care about other members environments and help them build emotionally stable environments.

Pursue the "common good" by making safe environments for yourself as well as others!

4-H LIVESTOCK VET INSPECTIONS FOR THE FAIR

The Wyoming State Vet has recommended that animals receive an "on-site" vet check the day that animals are brought on the fairgrounds. Teton County 4-H and the Teton County Fair Board require that all animals receive an on-site vet check to receive their animal health certificate. Vet inspections will be done on Wednesday of the Fair starting at 11 a.m. on Snow King Ave. in front of the Fairgrounds. Animals will remain in their trailers during the vet inspection. Vehicles trailering animals should approach the Fairgrounds on the west side via Snow King Ave. Vehicles will be traveling east and vet inspections will take place in front of the Rodeo Arena/Heritage arena. Vehicles will then enter the fairgrounds through the East Gate and travel to the Heritage Arena to drop off livestock. Any animals not passing the vet inspection will be asked to leave the fairgrounds at that time. In order to make this process run smoothly, please arrive at the Fairgrounds with your animals based on your club's scheduled time, which will be sent to you in a letter regarding this process.

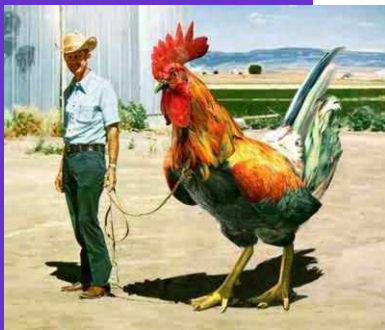

2011 TETON COUNTY FAIR NEWS

The Teton County Fair Office will again be issuing permits to camp on the fairgrounds during the Teton County Fair. The spaces are located just north of the grassy arena. The permit will cost \$10 and will be available in the Fair Office beginning Monday, July 18 at 8:00 a.m. for Moran and Alta families **ONLY**. Beginning Wednesday, July 20 at 8:00 a.m., Kelly, Moose, and Hoback families **ONLY** may purchase their permits. Beginning Monday, July 25 at 8:00 a.m., other families will be allowed to purchase permits. We will most likely sell out of permits at some time. You will not be allowed to park your camping vehicle on the fairgrounds prior to getting a permit or before Monday, July 25. There is a limit of one (1) permit per 4-H family. Remember, camping at the fair was originally approved for 4-Hers who must travel a long distance each day and space is limited.

There will be no through traffic allowed from the west part of the fairgrounds to the east part and vice versa. All horse trailers should enter from the west side of the fairgrounds off of Flat Creek Drive and exit on to Flat Creek Drive or Snow King Avenue.

Again this year, the first bedding of shavings **ONLY** will be provided free of charge for all 4-H livestock animals. Any additional shavings must be provided by the 4-H clubs or individual 4-Hers.

Stalls for 4-H horses will be available free of charge in the pavilion until noon on Wednesday, July 27. Please call the Fair Office to reserve your stalls.

Horse trailers will only be allowed at the Heritage Arena to load and unload animals. If you need to leave a horse trailer on the fairgrounds overnight, please park it in the large parking lot on the far west side of the fairgrounds (south of the carnival).

Food and drink will not be allowed in the Heritage Arena, except in the enclosed concession area. Ecoli is a huge concern these days and the Teton County Fair Board is committed to enforcing preventive measures.

Again this year, you will be required to take your manure out the east Heritage Arena door to a dumpster located in that area. You will not be allowed to move manure through the north doors. These are the doors where most of the visitors enter.
