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4-H Parents, What is Your Role?

4-H is a family program, which means parent/guardians have a role in the success of their children with their 4-H projects.

Here is a brief description of what a 4-H parent's role looks like:

Purpose: To assist and support your child and other children in the 4-H club.

Success Criteria: Through the experiential learning (hands-on learning) process, the children in the 4-H club will gain knowledge and skills to positively and successfully respond to life's varying situations.

Responsibilities: To assist or encourage your child and other children in the club to:

- Set realistic project and achievement goals
- Accomplish those goals, where appropriate
- Participate in club, regional, state, national, and international programs
- Use positive reinforcement of each child's part in the group

- Provide transportation to and from meetings and special activities
- Attend meetings and special events of the club or group

To complete a parent volunteer survey and/or discuss with the 4-H leader, the areas where you could assist the club. Depending on the time that you have available, you may:

- Plan and facilitate special events for the club or group
- Learn about the developmental needs of the different ages of children in the club or group
- Make phone calls
- Lend use of home for meetings
- Serve as a project leader or helper in one or more project areas
- Assist with meetings or special events (tours, fund raisers, fairs, etc.)
- Serve as an adult advisor to one or more committees

Time Required: Approximately 1-5 hours per month (providing transportation, attending meetings, helping child with projects or activity work; varies according to task)

Target Dates: October through September

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





Responsibility Activity

Time needed: 15-20 minutes	Instructions: Introduce what responsibility is. For every action there is a reaction or consequence. Following the discussion, have youth identify examples of parts of their lives that they are responsible for. This could include homework, feeding their animals, laundry, cooking dinner, following the rules, etc.
Supplies Needed:	
⇒ 3-5 balloons for each participant	After the youth have each listed examples orally have them write down 3-5 things they are responsible for on the small pieces of paper provided. One item on each piece of paper. Then have them put <u>one</u> piece of paper in each balloon, blow up the balloons and tie them off—you may have to help tie the balloon.
⇒ Pencils or pens	Then the youth form a circle and play volleyball with all the balloons, with the goal of not letting any drop on the floor. If a balloon falls on the floor, they cannot pick it up and start passing it to others. After 30 seconds stop the game. Have the youth pop the balloons that fell on the floor and share which responsibility did not get completed and what would be the consequence for that action. You can repeat the game with the balloon that were still in play.

Congratulations to Jed Christensen!

Thirty youth will visit Mongolia through Wyoming 4-H leadership program

Wyoming State 4-H specialists will shepherd 30 youth and five adult chaperones from eight states to Mongolia this summer in a leadership partnership with the Mongolian 4-H Youth Organization.

Enhancing Global Perspectives in Youth is funded by a \$267,434 grant from the United States Department of State Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs and administered by the University of Wyoming Cooperative Extension Service. The Mongolian group is in the country's capital, Ulaanbaatar.

The group will leave June 16 and return July 15.

"The program will provide an opportunity for students to experience firsthand knowledge of foreign cultures and to collaborate on solving global natural resource and environmental issues," said Warren Crawford, youth development specialist with Wyoming 4-H.

Kim Reaman, state 4-H volunteer management specialist, will also accompany the group.

"This type of experience can be life changing and start a young person down the path to being an involved, global citizen," she said. "My first international experience was through the International 4-H Youth Exchange to Jamaica. I have had a heart for international programs and the effect they have on a young person's life ever since."

Youth were selected through an application and interview process from the 13-state western region of the land-grant universities Cooperative Extension Service. The finalists selected are from Alaska, Colorado, Idaho, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

Reaman and Crawford traveled to Mongolia last September, paid for by the UW College of Agriculture and Natural Resources Global Perspectives program, to provide technical assistance and training for the newly established Mongolian 4-H program. While in Mongolia, they had many opportunities to develop and lay the groundwork for this exchange program.

"For most of the stay, the students will live with a Mongolian host family and experience the Mongolian way of life," said Crawford. "While we are there, we will be learning about environmental issues such as renewable energy, water quality and land restoration and reclamation."

Youth will also participate in community service projects in and around the capital city of Ulaanbaatar.



Teton County Youth Ventures Contest
Business Plans due Friday, May 20th, 2011
Presentations on May 24th, 2011

Overview

The Youth Business Ventures Contest provides an opportunity for youth to develop and present a business plan for competition. Youth participants will compete for seed money to start a new business or grow an existing business. The purpose of the competition is to:

- Encourage 4-H members to develop an entrepreneurial mindset than will benefit them in future career opportunities.
- Help youth to learn the process of developing a business plan.
- Provide an avenue for youth to practice and develop effective verbal communication skills.
- Encourage 4-H members to establish goals and determine a course of action that will assist them in accomplishing those goals.
- Provide monetary awards for youth to start or grow their business.

Eligibility

This contest is open to all 4-H members currently enrolled in the Teton County 4-H Program. Members may compete as a sole proprietor or partnership (see below for explanation).

Sole Proprietor

Sole proprietor is defined as one business owner. The business plan and business presentation will be written and presented by one individual. There is no limit to the number of individuals able to compete in the contest.

Partnerships

Partnerships are defined as 2 or more primary business owners. The business plan and business presentation will be written and presented by each member of the partnership. There is no limit to the number of partnerships able to compete in the contest.

Categories

Sole Proprietor – separate divisions for each age category as follows:

Junior: 8-10 years of age on January 1, 2011

Intermediate: 11-13 years of age on January 1, 2011

Senior: 14-19 years of age on January 1, 2011

Partnership – no age categories or age restrictions. All partnerships will compete in the same division.

Contest

The contest will consist of two parts. The first part will be the written business plan. Participants will be required to fill out the cover page and business plan, providing as much detail as deemed appropriate.

The second part consists of the business presentation. Participants will be required to present their business plan to a committee detailing the type of business, major components of the business, and marketing strategies. This is the participants' chance to sell their business and ideas to the committee.

Presenters are responsible for their own equipment and should set up as early as possible. (Easels, tables, and a screen will be provided.) Those using Power Point should arrive early (at least 20 minutes) so the presentation is ready to start at the designated time.

Awards

Business plans and presentations will be evaluated by a committee who will determine the overall winner based on these two components. Cash awards will be given as seed money to deserving competitors in each sole proprietor age division and partnership division.

4-H Record Books


Now is a great time to set aside some time at a club meeting to discuss 4-H Record Books. Hopefully by now, either within a club meeting or on their own, 4-H'ers have worked to set goals for this year in each of their projects. If this conversation hasn't occurred, please take some time to help members to set some good goals.

Setting goals helps 4-H members have some control over what they are focusing on for this year, or referring back to the Essential Elements of Positive Youth Development—an **Opportunity for Self-Determination**. These goals can and should also be used in planning the year.

Also, please be encouraging your members to keep track of their expenses and income throughout the year. Keeping receipts will help them a great deal at the end of the year.

Another tip is to have youth write one or two things they learned at each meeting on the club agenda or 4-H Calendar. This will help them recall major things that happened at the end of the year for the "Knowledge and Skills Acquired" section of the Record Book.

Finally, each Jr. Leader has made it a goal to mentor a project club. They will be contacting you in the next few weeks to arrange a time for them to come to one of your meetings. Their focus will be helping your members with any Record Book questions, offering their own personal tips and strategies for working on Record Books, and being there as another resource for 4-H members to contact.

They will also have some other plans they will share with you.

4-H Record Books are an essential part of the 4-H experience; as much as the project work itself. The Record Book is a chance for the youth to reflect on their year and apply what they learned to their lives and the future.

Record Books are also what is used in determining the level of achievement a member receives each year, as well as 4-H Scholarships and trips as a youth gets older.

4-H Leader Spotlight : Anjie Beard



A 4-H member is expected to fit and groom his/her own animal at the Teton county fair. However in the interest of safety a member may be assisted by another currently enrolled bona fide Teton county 4-H member or project leader.

A 4-H member is expected to care for their own animal; however, in the interest of safety in caring for animals members may receive limited age and skill appropriate assistance.
