One of the most common questions I get each year is what is a 4-H Record Book?


What is a Record Book?

One of the most important aspects of 4-H is to learn the skills necessary to become a productive citizen. Record keeping becomes an important skill that is used to reinforce growth while teaching members the importance of keeping good records. These records help members to set goals, keep track of activities, and reflect on what they have learned in the year. The Record Book is also what is judged to determine the level of recognition the 4-H Member achieves.

There are several benefits to keeping good 4-H records through the entire 4-H career. First, as members enter their senior years of 4-H there are several opportunities to travel throughout the United States. Many of these trips are based on 4-H records that date back to the beginning of the 4-H career. There are also scholarships available for members that plan to attend a college or university. By keeping good records 4-H members will be able to track their leader-

ship, community service, and other activities that most applications ask for.

[This is the time of year to be thinking about your goals for this year.](#)

S – Specific – Explain exactly what is going to be done.

M – Measurable – What is the result? What will result from the action or what is intended to be done? Sometime numbers are helpful in this step.

A – Attainable – Can this goal really be accomplished?

R – Realistic – Does the member have control over what happens in the goal? The 4-H member can control their participation in this event and making or doing something.

[However, members cannot control awards and recognition, like blue ribbons or grand champions, etc.](#)

T – Time Bound – When will this goal be done? Set a realistic time to complete the goal.

4-H project goals are recorded in the 4-H Record Book in the project specific pages. They should be set at the beginning of the 4-H year and used as reference throughout the year.

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

Be aware that each scholarship has a different deadline. Late applications will not be accepted.

*****Scholarship Tip***** If part of the application process is an interview, be sure to dress for success. Appropriate dress would include what you might wear for a job interview or presentation:



Male: slacks, button down shirt, tie, dress shoes or boots (no athletic shoes or clothing)

Female: Skirts or slacks with an appropriate blouse or shirt. Khaki pants or skirts are also appropriate. (no athletic shoes or clothing)



4-H Club Chartering

The Wyoming 4-H Program continues the Club Chartering Program in an effort to maintain consistency in the 4-H program and support the Essential Elements of Positive Youth Development. 4-H programs in every state are responsible to the United States Department of Agriculture through National 4-H Headquarters. At the direction of National 4-H Headquarters, the Wyoming 4-H program continues to require the chartering of all 4-H Clubs and Committees.


Below are the requirements to obtain an official club charter or renew your club's charter for the year.

The last two items are due in the **4-H Office by February 18th or immediately following your first 4-H club meeting**.

These pages can be found in your Club's Yearly Book under the "Beginning of the Year" tab.

1. Membership of at least five (5) members from at least two (2) separate families.
2. Screened volunteer leader to supervise and organize the club. Leaders must be screened and receive training every 5 years to maintain leader status.
3. 4-H Club meets during the 4-H Year (at least 6 times is recommended)
4. **Complete and submit 4-H Club Charter Application (found in your 4-H Club's Yearly Book)**
5. **Sign and submit Affirmative Action Form (found in your 4-H Club's Yearly Book)**

Yearly Book" at the conclusion of the 4-H year (**due to the 4-H Office by August 31, 2011**)

1. 4-H Club Secretary Book with minutes from all meetings held
2. 4-H Club Treasurer Book pgs. 39, 40, 41, and 43 completed
3. Educational Learning Goals Report Form
4. Community Service Report Form
5. 4-H Club's Project Meeting Report form

At the county level, Todd is a regular attendee of 4-H Council meetings and livestock committee meetings. He contributes



Livestock**Please make note of the change to the livestock fitting rule in Teton County 4-H:**

A 4-H member is expected to fit and groom his/her own animal at the Teton county fair. However in the interest of safety a member may be assisted by another currently enrolled bona fide Teton county 4-H member or project leader.

A 4-H member is expected to care for their own animal; however, in the interest of safety in caring for animals members may receive limited age and skill appropriate assistance.

All Livestock members are invited and encouraged to attend this opportunity to learn how to be a responsible producer.



Interactive and fun activities will make up the majority of this program, so come willing to participate. Youth will be divided into groups based on experience.
