



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WELCOME

Providing the highest quality services and improving the health of our community are why we are proud to serve Teton County. Our staff and I look forward to continuing our work together to make health available to all.








Administration

- Support a process of quality improvement




Community Health




Emergency Preparedness and Response




Environmental Health

Environmental Health staff provides public health protection and education through a variety of programs. In addition to routine inspections of food establishments, recreational water facilities, childcare facilities, and body art establishments, Environmental Health is focused on educating the community by providing classes and educational materials. Classes provided by the Division include pool operating training and food safety manager training. Environmental Health also acts as a resource for drinking water quality, indoor air quality, childhood lead poisoning, radon & other general environmental health hazards.




Nursing and Clinical Services

Public Health Nursing provides client-centered quality care and services at the individual, family and community level in a culturally competent manner. Programs include: Communicable Disease, Family Planning, Immunization and Laboratory Services, Maternal and Child Health (MCH) and Outreach Education and Programming.



County Health Officer

The County Health Officer is a licensed medical provider in the State of Wyoming appointed by the Teton District Board of Health with approval from the Board of County Commissioners to serve Teton County.


FINANCIALS

EXPENSES:

The overall expense this year is \$1,405,263.58.

This represents an increase over last Fiscal Year of \$77,553.42 (5.84%).


The majority of this expense increase is reflected in Staff Salaries/Benefits, Advertising, Travel/Training, and Family Planning while most all other expense categories either remained the same or were slightly lower than last Fiscal Year.



FINANCIALS

INCOME:

The overall revenue, including Grants, this Fiscal Year is \$625,341.59. This represents an increase over the last Fiscal Year of \$560,766.11 (11.52%). The majority of the increase was due to increases in Grant Revenue.



GRANTS:

Public Health received the following grants/contracts this Fiscal Year:

- 1. Maternal and Child Health (MCH) \$96,000.00.
- 2. Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) \$58,000.00.
- 3. Public Health Emergency Preparedness \$83,000.00.
- 4. County Health Officer Emergency Preparedness \$9,600.00.
- 5. Title X Family Planning Grant \$16,659.00.
- 6. Miscellaneous Grants \$2,000.00. (Rotary Club Flu Vaccine Grant)

PROTECT YOURSELF AND YOUR LOVED ONES FROM RABIES EXPOSURE THIS SUMMER



Bats play an important role in our ecosystem by controlling insect populations, BUT THEY ARE ALSO A RESERVOIR OF RABIES IN WYOMING.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PREVENT HUMAN EXPOSURE TO RABIES?

- Vaccinate your pets
- Maintain control of your pets to reduce their exposure to wildlife
- Report any stray or ill animals to animal control
- Use window screens, chimney caps, and draft guards beneath doors to attics
- Make sure that all doors to the outside are tightly closed
- Seek expert advice on how to bat-proof your home and the time of year this should be done

RABIES IN HUMANS IS 100% PREVENTABLE
THROUGH PROMPT APPROPRIATE MEDICAL CARE.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends seeking medical attention in the following situations:

- Waking up in a room in which a bat is present
- An adult witnesses a bat in a room with a previously unattended child, mentally disabled person, or unattended individual
- Physical contact with or handling of a bat, even if bite marks are not seen

If you experience one of these situations, or direct contact with a bat, immediately contact your healthcare provider or Teton County Health Department (307-733-6401) for help and further information.

Health in All Policies (HiAP) is a framework that uses a collaborative approach to improve the health of a community by incorporating health, sustainability and health equity considerations into decision-making and policy decisions across sectors by acknowledging that the social determinants of health have a profound effect on the health of a community.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

NURSING & CLINICAL SERVICES

IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM:



2884 immunization visits.

- Immunization Doses - 1388 given (not including Flu shots).
- 1197 Flu shots given. 395 of the Flu shots were to individuals 65+.
- 84 Pneumococcal vaccines given to individuals 65+. This includes both available pneumococcal vaccines, Prevnar 13 (PCV 13) and Pneumovax (PPSV23).
- 80% of vaccinations are given to adults 19+. 10% of vaccines given to adults were Tdap. 58% of vaccines given to adults were for Influenza.
- 295 clients received interpreter services for clinic services.

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH (MCH) PROGRAM:

- 497 face-to-face visits to Maternal & Child Health clients.
- 377 face-to-face visits with TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families)



For a family to qualify for TANF they must meet specific qualifications:

- 1) Are they pregnant?
- 2) Are they the primary caregiver?
- 3) The parent or child must be a lawful, permanent resident or citizen of the United States.
- 4) The income for the family size is at or below 185% poverty level.

- 211.25 hours of interpreter time was spent in direct contact with TANF clients and 145.67 hours of time was spent with non-TANF clients.

FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM:



- 1380 client visits. Of those client visits, 372 visits needed interpreter services.
- 782 individual clients served.
 - 689 were new clients and 93 were continuing clients.
 - 492 clients had an income level at or below 150% poverty level.
 - 89% of clients who saw a nurse practitioner did not have health insurance.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE PROGRAM:



- 822 sexually transmitted disease (STD) tests done in 2017/2018.
- 30,000 condoms distributed.
- 43 positive cases of Chlamydia.
- 5 positive cases of Gonorrhea.
- 1 positive case of Syphilis.

- 9 HIV cases managed.

The Case Management Society of America describes case management as, “a collaborative process of assessment, planning, facilitation and advocacy for options and services to meet an individual’s health needs through communication and available resources to promote quality cost-effective outcomes.”

OUTBREAK INVESTIGATION:

- 1 salmonella case.
- 21 bat case follow-ups.
- 1 direct observed therapy for Tuberculosis (TB).
- 3 cases of latent TB infections.
- Tularemia found in a marmot.



MEDICATION DONATION PROGRAM:

- In average wholesale price (AWP), \$9,977.40 worth of medications were donated.
- In AWP \$7,694.07 worth of medications were dispensed to patients.

SHARPS DISPOSAL PROGRAM:

- Collected 22 total containers and 371.3 pounds of sharps.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Food Service Inspection Program:

- 493 routine inspections and 26 pre-opening inspections were conducted.
- There are 383 food establishments in Teton County. 178 establishments were categorized as high risk, 126 medium risk, 72 low risk and 7 were not categorized.
 - 1) Low risk - The establishment's operation involves coffee, carbonated beverages, and snack items such as a convenience or retail store. One routine inspection and one telephone inquiry annually.
 - 2) Medium risk - Establishment has limited menu with minimal preparation of items that are cooked to order such as a sandwich shop or fast food. One routine inspection and one telephone inquiry annually.
 - 3) High risk - Full service establishment where preparation process includes cooking, cooling and holding or food is served to a high risk population. These include schools, restaurants and grocery stores. Two full inspections annually.
- All critical violations that cannot be corrected during the inspection require a follow-up inspection.
 - 275 follow-up inspections were conducted when there was a critical violation, of those visits 70 subsequent visits were needed to correct the problem.
 - Most common critical food violation was cold holding; the second most common was datemarking.
 - There were 330 Temporary Food Permits issued.



POOL/ SPA INSPECTION PROGRAM:

- There are 131 pools and spas in Teton County. They require 2 inspections per year.
- There were 193 routine inspections and 6 pre-opening inspections conducted.
- The most common pool and spa critical violations were record keeping and minimum testing frequencies met, followed by pool or spa water quality, usually having to do with the sanitizer levels.

CHILDCARE ESTABLISHMENT INSPECTIONS PROGRAM:

- There were 41 inspections conducted. Each of the 41 establishments must be inspected annually in order to be licensed by the Wyoming Department of Family Services.

BODY ART ESTABLISHMENT INSPECTIONS PROGRAM:

- There are 3 body art establishments and 3 practitioners in Teton County. Body Art Establishments need to be inspected yearly.

RADON PROGRAM:

- 194 radon test kits were distributed. The highest value seen was 37.5 piC/L.



POOL/SPA/FOOD CLASSES:

- Two Certified Pool Operator classes were offered. The total participants for both classes was 39.
- There were 2 food service courses offered and Environmental Health Staff also proctored 20 food service exam sessions.






WATER TESTING PROGRAM:

- There were 1,991 drinking water tests sampled. 110 tested positive for Total Coliform, and 9 tested positive for *E.coli*.
- There were 1,180 pool/spa water samples. 67 tests exceeded the bacteria threshold limit.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS & RESPONSE

- Assistance in real-world events:
 - 1) SJMC Tamiflu assistance
 - 2) Total Solar Eclipse
 - 3) Tularemia found in marmot.
- Plans for Emergency Operations and Strategic National Stockpile updated annually.
- 18 exercises and drills were conducted in FY '18.
- Participated in 3 exercises hosted by partner organizations.
- 94% of staff are Fit Tested for an N95 mask.
- 86% of staff are trained in Basic Incident Command System.
- 33% of staff are trained in Advanced Incident Command System.
