Dear Community Member,

I am pleased to share with you the Teton County Health Department annual report for 2020-2021. We are fortunate in Teton County to have the support of the community, the Board of Health, and the Board of County Commissioners in carrying out our work. We would like to thank them for this support and for allowing us to work toward our Mission, to promote the health and wellbeing of the community through protection and prevention efforts in collaboration with an engaged public and other community partners.

This last year there were major changes that occurred in our COVID-19 response as federal and state funding sources became available. In this fiscal year we were able to hire approximately 87 COVID staff to help in the response. These staff assisted in public information, isolation and quarantine guidance, vaccine clinics, connecting the community with testing and answering questions, assisting businesses as they worked through COVID-19 challenges, and more. These staff allowed our regular staff to transition out of the COVID-19 response and back to our regular programs. During this fiscal year the first COVID-19 vaccinations became available and easier to access testing also became possible through the Curative kiosks. The Teton County Health Department continued to build off its foundation for the COVID-19 response from last fiscal year and continued to expand its capabilities and resources for the community.

We continue to strive for fiscal responsibility by maximizing resources through grant opportunities and the collection of fees for services. We continue to provide a high level of service throughout the Department including family planning client visits, immunizations provided, maternal and child health visits, drinking water samples tested, food inspections, pool and spa inspections, promotion of health messages through community events, advertising and other outreach efforts, promoting the Network of Care (a community resource guide and community data indicator website), prevention services related to alcohol, tobacco and other drugs, and suicide prevention.

Providing the highest quality services and improving the health of our community are why we are proud to serve Teton County. Our staff and I look forward to continuing our work together to make health available to all.

The areas of concern are the prevention of suicide, underage alcohol use, adult binge drinking, opioid prescription and other drugs, and tobacco.

Environmental Health

Environmental Health staff provides public health protection and education through a variety of programs. In addition to routine inspections of food establishments, recreational water facilities, childcare facilities, and body art establishments, Environmental Health is focused on educating the community by providing classes and educational materials. Classes provided by the Division include pool operator training and food safety manager training. Environmental Health also acts as a resource for drinking water quality, indoor air quality, lead poisoning, radon testing, and other general environmental health hazards.


Teton District Board of Health

FINANCIALS

INCOME:

The overall revenue, including grants, this Fiscal Year is \$3,367,016.77. This represents an increase over the last Fiscal Year of \$2,171,823.59 of which the majority is attributed to COVID-19 Grant revenue.



FINANCIALS

EXPENSES:

The overall expenses this year are \$4,594,143.82. This represents an increase over last fiscal Year of \$2,516,404.35. The majority of this increase is reflected in Staff Salaries/Benefits and expenses related to COVID-19 (Extra Hire Salaries/Benefits – \$1,246,649.58, Overtime – \$22,618.63, and Supplies – \$1,127,774.34) while most all other expense categories decreased from the last Fiscal Year. All COVID-19 expenses are reimbursed through federal grant funding or donations from the Community Foundation.

Fase de Riesgo Crítico en el Condado de Teton

¿Qué significa el color MORADO y qué se puede hacer?

El Departamento de Salud del Condado de Teton ha creado un sistema de salud pública con colores de colores para proporcionar información para nuestros residentes de la comunidad que pueden minimizar la propagación de COVID-19.

Los números de propagación han cambiado de una categoría "Gris", entre niveles de propagación moderada y alta, a "Morado" en nuestra comunidad y que ya ha expuesto al equipo de Investigación de Casos y al Departamento de Contactos, con tanto caso nuevo.

Dar espacio en el trabajo. Mantener distanciamiento social y lavarse las manos. Evitar reuniones y reuniones recreativas a extranjeros con miembros que no viven en su casa.

Evita espacios con mucha gente. Evita las 3 "C's". Entre espacios Comunitarios, evita el alto riesgo de COVID-19, como el Confinamiento en lugares sin ventilación.

Mínimiza sus salidas y la despensa y límita realizar otros servicios fuera de casa. Evita el uso de personas de servicio y minimizar las visitas a lugares de comercio y servicios.

Mantenga las superficies limpias y desinfectadas. Desinfectar regularmente las superficies de alto contacto en su casa.

Proteja a los miembros de la Comunidad más vulnerables. No asistir a reuniones a hospitales, al lado de los ancianos y a otras personas de cuidado personal. Mantener a través de la salud mental.

Realmente uso medidas preventivas para minimizar el riesgo y controlar los siguientes recomendaciones:

Quedese en casa. Quedarse en casa cuando siente síntomas, incluso si tiene leve descomodidad. No asistir a reuniones ni asistir a reuniones con su familia ni la familia de otros y no ir a reuniones.

Use un cubrebocas. Siempre lleve un cubrebocas seco con múltiples capas en público.

Mantenga su distancia. Mantenga por lo menos 6 pies de distancia de otras personas tanto en público, incluyendo cuando esté usando un cubrebocas.

Lave sus manos regularmente. Lave sus manos con jabón y agua por lo menos 20 segundos y use sanitizante cuando el jabón y agua no estén disponibles.



COVID-19 response

Timeline of Important Events

- July 2020 In partnership with the Town of Jackson and Weed and Pest wastewater samples were analyzed for COVID-19 to determine levels of COVID-19 in the community
- July 2020 Requirement for TCHD's surveillance testing program for COVID-19 began
- July 20, 2020 Public Health Order #20-6 requiring that adults wear face coverings when entering or inside a retail or commercial business went into effect
- July 2020 Teton District Health Officer Recommendation #9 recommending early closure of all bars and restaurants
- August 2020 Surveillance testing program begins in partnership with TCHD and St. John's Health.
- October 2020 Teton District Health Officer Issues Recommendation #10: COVID-19 Recommendations for the General Public
- October 2020 Teton District Health Officer Issues Recommendation #11: COVID-19 Recommendations for Public when in Orange (Moderate) Risk; Mask Order and Early Closure Recommendation Extended Until November 30, 2020
- November 2020 Teton District Health Officer Reissues Recommendation #10: COVID-19 Recommendations for Public when in Red (High) Risk
- November 2020 Mask Order Extended Through January 4, 2021
- December 2020 Curative kiosks established to offer no-cost send out COVID-19 testing for Teton County community members
- December 2020 Recommendation #12: Gather with Members of Your Household Only
- December 2020 Shred the Spread and Be Kind for Teton Kind campaigns launched to provide the community with preventative measures and consistent messaging regarding COVID-19
- December 2020 COVID-19 vaccination campaign started. TCHD followed the Wyoming Department of Health's list of prioritized groups
- January 2021 Critical Level (Purple) was added to the color-coded guidance system for the COVID risk level based on extreme number of cases
- January 2021 Teton District Health Officer Reissues Recommendation #11: Gather in Household Groups Only through February 14, 2021
- March 2021 Teton County Receives Approval for Local Mask Order: Effective March 16 through April 16, 2021
- March 2021 First Mass COVID-19 Vaccine Clinic at KMart Location, Vaccinated 1,000 Community Members
- April 2021 COVID-19 vaccine appointments for the General Public opened
- April 2021 Teton County Extends Local Mask Order through May 17, 2021
- May 2021 COVID-19 vaccine was authorized for individuals ages 12+
- May 2021 56% of Teton County community members were vaccinated against COVID-19
- May 2021 Mask Order in Effect June 1 through 11, 2021 for Public and Private K-12 Schools
- June 2021 Mobile outreach COVID-19 vaccine clinics begin with use of the vaccine bus



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Changes to Internal Services

By late Summer/Fall of 2021, TCHD was able to begin hiring additional COVID-19 staff to assist in the response. From July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021, 87 COVID-19 staff were hired. These staff allowed the core TCHD staff to transition back to the programs to which they are normally assigned.

The Nursing Staff were utilized as liaisons to special groups designated in the COVID-19 response (housing, childcare, schools, food insecurity, etc.) and assisted with contact tracing and case investigating and handled incoming COVID-19 calls before a full team was hired.

Environmental Health (EH) Staff served as a primary point of contact for many local businesses and developed several procedures and documents to guide them during the Pandemic. Staff also devoted significant time to interpreting and explaining health orders to businesses. EH staff were able to return to basic services implementing announced inspections during this fiscal year. COVID-19 responsibilities were transitioned to the COVID Public Health Advisor, the EH Supervisor and EH Administrative Assistant.



COVID-19 response



COVID-19 RESPONSE

- A total of 4,561 COVID-19 cases occurred and were investigated July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021
- 26,839 doses of COVID-19 vaccines were administered by the Health Department
1,031 J&J vaccine given, 4,820 Moderna vaccine given, 20,988 Pfizer given
- 104 Volunteers and hired Vaccinators were utilized for the administration of COVID-19 vaccinations
- 150+ Call Center Volunteers assisted in answering real time COVID-19 questions from the public
- 500 Clinic Volunteers dedicated their time to assist with various COVID-19 vaccine clinic duties
- 150+ Call Center Volunteers assisted in answering real time COVID-19 questions from the public
- 20 COVID-19 vaccine outreach clinics took place with 17 different organizations/partners for a total of 217 doses given
- 500+ students were vaccinated at the school-based and COVID-19 vaccine clinics on May 17, and May 18, 2021

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

HEALTH DEPARTMENT STATS

NURSING & CLINICAL SERVICES

IMMUNIZATIONS PROGRAM:



3,155 vaccines were given other than COVID vaccines

- 2,574 flu vaccines
- 602 vaccines were given to those under 18 years old
- 379 were flu vaccines to those under 18 years old
- 613 clinic visits required an Interpreter (includes visits for Family Planning, Immunizations, and MCH)

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH (MCH) PROGRAM:

- 515 total MCH visits for the year
- 276 appointments with home visiting clients (includes home visits, telehealth, and clinic)
- 125 Medicaid application assistance appointments
- 71 Children's Special Health appointments
- 43 appointments for other services including child safety education, car seat installations, and lactation for non-home visiting clients



In addition, MCH nurses are working to improve Maternal Mental Health in our community and statewide through programs such as Postpartum Support International (PSI) Wyoming, Stroll Wyoming, and 2020 Mom Maternal Mental Health Public Health Fellowship.

FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM:



- 1,990 clinic visits (317 STD counseling/testing only)
- Long-Acting Removable Contraceptives (LARCs)
 - 70% of all IUDs inserted onsite; 100% of IUD requested removals were done on-site
 - 88% of all implants inserted on-site; 93% of implant requested removals were done on-site
- CANCER PREVENTION: Clinic FNPs ordered 174 PAPs, 91 mammograms, 9 colonoscopies
- PREGNANCY: 197 focused discussions and/or tests
- MENTAL HEALTH: The clinic averages 2 referrals per week for further care for mental health services, intimate partner violence, or substance abuse assistance with access to various services including applications for financial assistance to access the programs
- REFERRALS/APPLICATIONS
 - 53 referrals to local providers
 - 134 clients assisted with applications to St. John's Foundation Women's Health Care Fund, WY Cancer Care, Bayer, Merck, Gilead, and others
- 74 tests done for non-reportable sexually transmitted diseases (Herpes, Mycoplasma, Ureaplasma and Trichomoniasis, Vaginitis Panels)

Teton County Family Planning (TCFP) has continued to provide birth control, Well Woman exams, and reproductive and sexual health care throughout the pandemic, with a steadily increasing number of clients. From July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021, the Clinic staff continued to provide ongoing services for our clients by phone, telehealth, and in-person visits, as the increased demand for all types of birth control, including LARCs, persisted.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE PROGRAM:

Sexual Health Services

- 764 STD (sexually transmitted diseases) tests done in 2020/2021 for reportable diseases (Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, Hepatitis B & C, and Syphilis)
- 466 HIV tests (152 through Family Planning Clinic)
- 46 cases treated for Chlamydia and or Gonorrhea (reportable STIs)
- HIV Case Management: 10 cases managed
- PrEP Case Management: 13 cases managed



PrEP, or Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis, is an **HIV prevention** method in which people who don't have **HIV** take **HIV** medicine daily to reduce their risk of getting **HIV** if they are exposed to the virus. **PrEP** can stop **HIV** from taking hold and spreading throughout the body. More clients accessed **PrEP** case management services from July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021.

MEDICATION DONATION PROGRAM:

- From July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021, Teton County donated \$1,071.19 of usable inventory

SHARPS DISPOSAL PROGRAM:


- Collected 29 total containers and 570 pounds of sharps. This was an increase in sharps disposal likely due to the increased number of vaccinations given this year (including COVID-19 vaccines)



ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

FOOD SERVICE INSPECTION PROGRAM:

- 444 Routine Inspections and 24 Pre-Opening Inspections conducted
- 10 Plan Reviews completed
- There are 355 food establishments in Teton County. 164 establishments were categorized as high risk, 114 medium risk, and 77 low risk
 - 1) Low risk – The establishment's operation involves coffee, carbonated beverages, and snack items such as a convenience or retail store. One routine inspection and one telephone inquiry annually.
 - 2) Medium risk – Establishment has limited menu with minimal preparation of items that are cooked to order such as a sandwich shop or fast food. One routine inspection and one telephone inquiry annually.
 - 3) High risk – Full service establishment where preparation process includes cooking, cooling, and holding or food is served to a high-risk population. These include schools, restaurants, and grocery stores. Two full inspections annually.



- The most common critical food violation was failure to have a certified food safety manager; the second most common was date marking
- There were 19 Temporary Food Permits issued. This number is very low due to the low number of special events during COVID-19 restrictions

POOL/ SPA INSPECTION PROGRAM:

- There are 157 pools and spas in Teton County. Seasonal facilities require one inspection per year; year-round require 2 inspections per year
- 152 Routine Inspections and 19 Pre-Opening Inspections were conducted
- The most common pool and spa critical violations were record keeping and minimum testing frequencies met, followed by pool or spa water quality, usually having to do with the sanitizer levels
- 16 Plan Reviews were completed

CHILDCARE ESTABLISHMENT INSPECTIONS PROGRAM:

- There were 34 inspections conducted. The Wyoming Department of Family Services has licensing authority for childcare establishments. They have been trained by EH staff and have taken over the sanitation inspection of those facilities that are not required to meet the Food Safety Rule. Those that are required to meet the rule were licensed with food licenses

BODY ART ESTABLISHMENT INSPECTIONS PROGRAM:

- There are 6 body art establishments and 6 practitioners in Teton County. Body Art Establishments and Practitioners need to be inspected yearly

RADON PROGRAM:

- 164 radon test kits were distributed. 113 results were reported back. 44 out of 113 test results, or 39%, were above the EPA action level (4.0 pCi/L)



POOL/SPA/FOOD CLASSES:

- One online Certified Pool Operator Course was offered with 24 participants. Staff created the online format due to COVID-19
- No Food Manager Safety Courses were offered due to COVID-19. Online options are available and were encouraged. Proctoring sessions were increased to twice a month to accommodate those who needed proctoring

WATER TESTING PROGRAM:

- There were 2,756 drinking water samples tested. 148 tested positive for Total Coliform, and 20 tested positive for E.coli
- There were 1,116 pool/spa water samples. 64 exceeded the bacteria threshold limit



EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS & RESPONSE

- Assistance in real-world events:



- COVID-19 Response in Teton County. The COVID-19 response was used to fulfill the public health preparedness and response program deliverables this fiscal year. The TCHD was operating under an incident command structure for the COVID-19 response
- 100% of staff are fit tested for N95 masks. The PHUR was also able to fit test home health staff for the Senior Center, staff at Legacy Lodge, and TCSD nurses
- PHRC worked with Teton County Emergency Management to fulfill resource requests for COVID-19. PHRC received multiple Strategic National Stockpile shipments throughout the response and was able to distribute these to identified organizations
